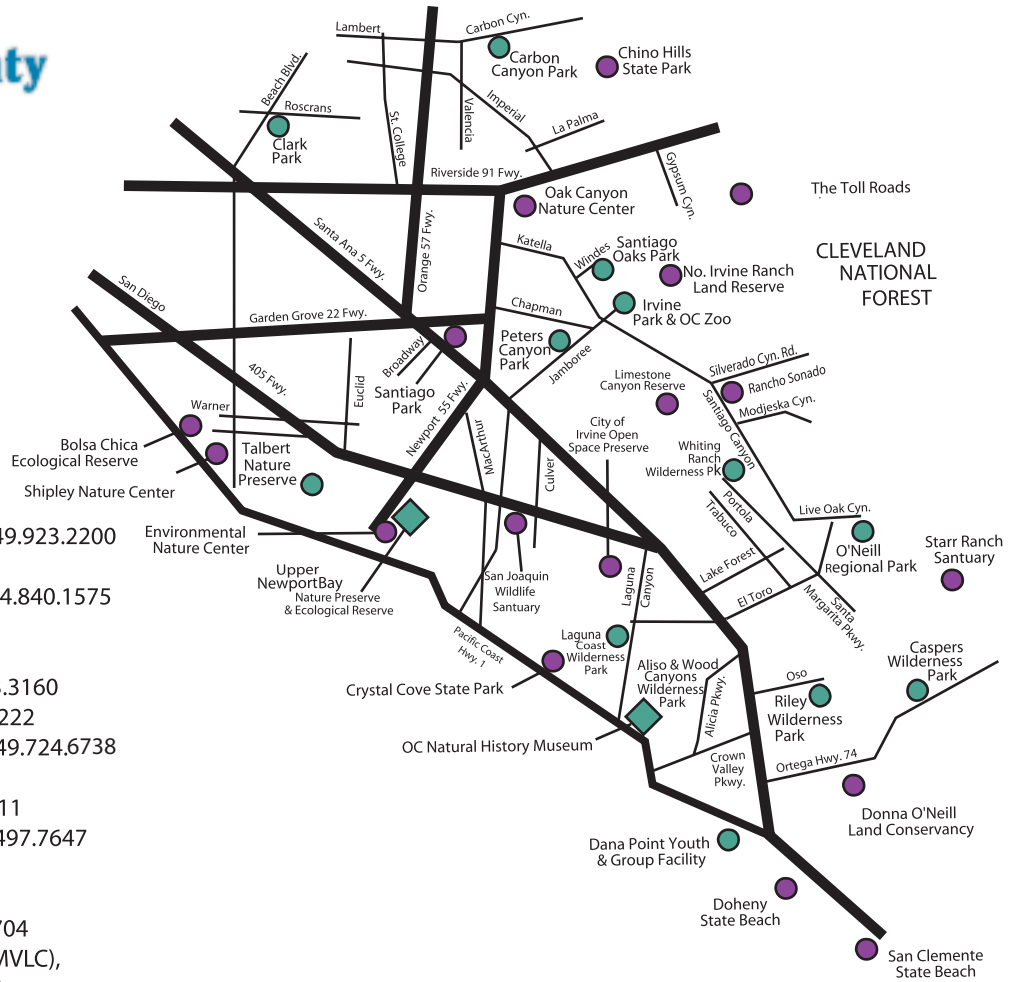

WILDLIFE SURVIVAL

1. Wildlife needs food, water, shelter & space.
2. The area where wildlife live must be large enough to provide for basic survival needs.
3. When you remove the things animals need, they die.
4. Most habitat is already occupied, so animals can't easily move to a new location.
5. Animals do not exist alone, but in populations. One animal of a kind cannot reproduce and continue a population.
6. If a population is too small, animals will breed with family members which may cause disease, birth defects and infertility.
7. If a population is small, it is more easily destroyed by natural events such as fire, flood or drought.
8. There must be enough habitat to have a large enough population to prevent inbreeding and destruction by natural disasters.
9. No population lives in isolation. Populations live in interdependent communities, depending on each other for food, water, shelter and space.
10. The loss of one species may ripple through an entire ecosystem and cause the loss of many other species - and even ecosystem collapse.
